Participation at Council Meeting Committees

I have attended every meeting of the full council and participated in most debates, speaking on many matters of concern to my residents and challenging the administration where necessary. The LDF particularly was of great concern to most residents in the ward, and I remain opposed to the release of Green Belt, particularly proposals for an industrial estate near Hartshead. I remain active with residents' groups trying to influence the new Local Plan.

As deputy leader of the Conservative group I have influenced policy matters and represented the group locally and nationally.

I have spoken on behalf of residents at several planning meetings and quasi-judicial hearings and have attended and chaired public meetings in the ward. I have supported local parents with school admissions appeals and have been present at most Area Committee meetings. Where Area Committee meetings clash with ward events, I tend to support the latter.

I was a member of the Corporate Governance and Audit Committee and Personnel Committee, and have attended most meetings of these committees.

Participation on Outside Bodies

I served on the West Yorkshire Police & Crime Panel, which challenges, scrutinises and supports the Police & Crime Commissioner, and I won a campaign to get recognition of traffic offences in the Commissioner's Policing Plan.

Ward Work

My work on behalf of constituents has been often and varied, ranging from planning queries to parking issues, road-safety and housing problems, anti-social neighbours etc. I have been proud to represent the council at local functions and am always keen to meet people.
