The Panel considered a report which outlined an application for the Grant of a Premises Licence for Shawcross Store Ltd, 128 Smallwood Road, Shaw Cross, Dewsbury, WF15 7RR.

Licensing Panel - 27 August 2025

The Licensing Officer advised the Panel that on the 7th July 2025, the Licensing Department received an application for the Grant of a Premises License in respect of Shawcross Store Ltd, 128 Smallwood Road, Shaw Cross, Dewsbury, WF15 7RR.

The licensable activity applied for was as follows:

Sale of Alcohol (off the premises) Monday to Sunday – 06:00 – 23:00

In response to the application, representations were received from two Ward Councillors in relation to the following licensing objectives not being achieved if the application was granted:

- Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- Public Safety
- Prevention of Public Nuisance
- Protection of Children from Harm.

No objections had been received from Responsible Authorities.

The applicant's representative advised the Panel that the applicant had significant experience in convenience retailing and alcohol sales. The shop had been running for 15 years, and the applicant planned to invest and revitalise the business which residents were in support of. The applicant would be partnering with Premier who were a well-known wholesaler and provided assurance in terms of products and services. A new CCTV system had been installed, and appropriate staff training would take place annually to ensure the licensing objectives were upheld. The applicant's representative also advised the Panel that the applicant was willing to amend the licensable hours applied for from 6:00 - 23:00 to 6:00 - 22:00.

The representations received, also highlighted concerns that the shop was situated in a residential area which was already under strain from crime, anti-social behaviour and environmental disturbance and that the sale of alcohol would increase the vulnerability and isolation of elderly resident.

The applicant was advised of the planning application submitted in 2019, which was a variation of condition 4 of the original application in 2015 relating to opening hours. As per condition 2, the current opening hours for Shawcross Store Ltd were 10:00 – 21:30 Monday to Saturday and 11:00 – 20:00 Sundays.

Having considered all the information presented both verbally and in writing, the Panel, in reaching its decision, had due regard to the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the statutory guidance issued under section 182 of the Act, the Councils Statement of Licensing Policy and the relevant provisions of the Human Rights Act.

That the application be granted with the following conditions:

The Panel considered a report which outlined an application for the Grant of a Premises Licence, Level, 47 – 49 Station Road, Batley, WF17 5SU.

The Licensing Officer outlined the application, advising the Panel that on the 4th August 2025, the Licensing Department received an application for the Grant of a Premises Licence, Level, 47 – 49 Station Road, Batley, WF17 5SU. The premises had previously been licensed as a night club from the 3rd August 2005 to the 30th January 2013. There had been no issues or concerns reported or recorded during that time.

Licensing Panel - 18 September 2025

The premises had benefitted from several Temporary Event Notices (TEN's), one application per month from the 16th December 2023 to the 20th December 2024. The events took place between 2pm and midnight on each occasion, and no issues or concerns were reported or recorded.

During the consultation period, a representation had been received from Kirklees Environmental Health Department, in relation to the following licensing objective not being met if the licence was granted:

- Prevention of Public Nuisance.

The representation highlighted concerns in relation to significant noise from customers using the premises, noise from amplified and non-amplified music and vibrations, which would impact on the four residential flats situated above the premises. The Environmental Health Officer suggested that should the licence be granted, the following recommendations be considered to try and reduce noise nuisance, which included:

- Notices displayed advising customers to enter and leave the premises quietly.

- The use of a sound limiter.
- Noise from amplified / non-amplified music to be non-audible in the four residential flats.

The applicants advised the Panel that they had consulted with local residents and had not received any objections, or complaints when they operated under Temporary Event Notice's. A sound test had been carried out which identified no noise leakage from the premises, and that sound levels met current legislation. The applicants were experienced in the industry; they had other successful establishments and were also knowledgeable in sound proofing.

The applicants advised the Panel that they did not intend to use the premises as a nightclub during the week but instead as a community space or place to hold events, which would be restricted to 11.30pm. A dispersion policy would be in place to help manage customers leaving the premises and other policies would evolve / be adapted once the premises was open, as required. The intention was to use the sub floor as the nightclub space which could accommodate around 150 people and close the upstairs section (which could hold 200 people) in order to help reduce the noise, but at a cost to the business. Regular noise checks would also be carried out.

Having considered all the information presented both verbally and in writing, the Panel, in reaching its decision, had due regard to the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the statutory guidance issued under section 182 of the Act, the Councils Statement of Licensing Policy and the relevant provisions of the Human Rights Act.

RESOLVED –

that the application for the Grant of a Premises Licence, Level, 47 – 49 Station Road, Batley, WF17 5SU, be granted as applied for.

The reason for the decision was:

- That granting the licence as applied for, would not be inconsistent with the four licensing objectives.

The Panel acknowledged the concerns raised by Environmental Health in relation to noise nuisance and advised the applicants that should any noise complaints be raised, it could result in a review of the premises licence.

The Panel considered a report which outlined an application for the Full Variation of a Premises Licence, The Office, Fold Head Mills, Huddersfield Road, Mirfield, WF14 8BE.

The Licensing Officer outlined the application, advising the Panel that on the 6th August 2025, the Licensing Department received an application for the Full Variation of a Premises Licence, The Office, Fold Head Mills, Huddersfield Road, Mirfield, WF14 8BE. The venue had benefitted from a premises licence since the 16th November 2016, which included the following licensable activities:

The application for a full variation was to increase the sale of alcohol, live and recorded music and late-night refreshments on a Friday and Saturday to 2am.

During the consultation period, representations were received from three Ward Councillors in relation to the following licensing objectives not been met if the variation was granted:

- Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- Public Safety
- The Prevention of Public Nuisance.

No representations had been received from Responsible Authorities. The Licensing Department had received one complaint regarding the premises in November 2021 but there had been no further reported or recorded complaints.

The applicant's representative advised the Panel that the premises had been fully operational from 2020 following the pandemic. The applicant operated a tight establishment and always adhered to the licensing objectives. There had been no Police activity or involvement from the Licensing Department to indicate crime and disorder. The premises had operated under 60 Temporary Event Notices (TEN's) until 2am, equating to approximately 100 days, and there had been no issues or complaints raised. Security Industry Authority (SIA) doormen would be in operation on Fridays and Saturdays when the premises were open until 2am.

Having considered all the information presented both verbally and in writing, the Panel, in reaching its decision, had due regard to the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the statutory guidance issued under section 182 of the Act, the Councils Statement of Licensing Policy and the relevant provisions of the Human Rights Act.

RESOLVED –

that the application for the Variation of a Premises Licence, The Office, Fold Head Mills, Huddersfield Road, Mirfield, WF14 8BE, be granted as requested.

Has GDPR been considered? GDPR has been considered and appropriate sections of the report and supporting documents have been amended.

1. Executive Summary

1.1 The purpose of the report is to inform members of an application for the full variation of a club premises certificate. Five representations have been received and is therefore referred to this panel for determination.

2. Information required to take a decision

2.1 Application

On 19th September 2025 the Licensing department received an application for the full variation of a club premises certificate for Drub Lane Working Men's Club, 104 Drub Lane, Cleckheaton, BD19 4BU. A copy of this application and plan is shown at **Appendix A**.

The current club premises certificate authorises the supply of alcohol between the following days and times:-

Day	From	To
Monday	20:00	23:30
Tuesday	20:00	23:30
Thursday	20:00	23:30
Friday	20:00	00:00
Saturday	20:00	00:00
Sunday	12:00	14:00
Sunday	20:00	23:00

There are several non-standard timings which can be viewed on the certificate, these are to remain the same.

On the current certificate there are several now obsolete licensable activities. With the exception of regulated entertainment these activities will not transfer over to the new licence should the variation be granted. This is due to the creation of the Live Music Act 2015, which resulted in regulated entertainment being deregulated.

The applicant seeks to amend the supply of alcohol timings on a Saturday and Sunday to the following.

Saturday	12:00 – 00:00
Sunday	12:00 – 23:00

A copy of the current Club Premises Certificate which includes all licensable activities can be seen at **Appendix B**.

During the consultation period, a total of 5 representations were received from members of the public. A copy of the representations can be seen at **Appendix C**.

The application was sent to the responsible authorities to which no objections have been received.

Over recent months, the club have been granted several Temporary Events Notices (TEN's) to extend their licensed hours and fill the gaps applied for on this variation, The TEN's took place on 10th & 16th August 2025 and 11th October 2025. The Licensing service does not have any recorded complaints on file regarding these TEN's.

2.2 Licensing Policy

Members considering the application must take note of the Authority's Statement of Licensing Policy, which provides the following guidance on how members should approach the application and representation(s).

Executive Summary

In exercising its duties and responsibilities under the terms of the Licensing Act 2003, the Council will operate within the statements and procedures mentioned in this policy statement. Notwithstanding this statement, all applications will be treated on their merits and judged accordingly.

The council will have regard to any relevant guidance issued by the Secretary of State in exercising its powers under the Act.

Purpose

The Licensing Authority will carry out its functions under the Licensing Act 2003 with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives contained in the Act and each has equal weight.

- The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- Public Safety
- The Prevention of Public Nuisance
- The Protection of Children from Harm

The Policy has four main purposes:

- To provide the basis for elected Members to make decisions on applications.
- To inform licence applicants of the basis on which decisions will be taken and therefore give some indication of how they will be able to operate.
- To inform the wider community of the basis on which decisions will be taken and therefore how their needs will be addressed.
- To inform the Courts how decisions have been made and to support those decisions.

The Licensing Authority recognises that each licence application must be considered on its own individual merits in the context of the four licensing objectives, and that unless relevant representations are received from responsible authority's or interested parties, there is no provision for a Licensing Authority to impose conditions on a licence other than those proposed within an application. Only conditions which have been volunteered by the applicant or which have been determined at a Licensing Panel hearing can be attached to a licence or certificate. If an application is lawfully made and no relevant representations are made in respect of an application, the Licensing Authority is under a

duty to grant the licence on the terms sought. Only if relevant representations are made will the Council's discretion be engaged.

2.3 Secretary of State Guidance

Members also need to consider the statutory guidance issued, by the Secretary of State, under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. As the representations related to 3 of the licensing objectives. Member's attention is drawn to this guidance, the relevant parts may be found at **Appendix D**.

3. **Implications for the Council**

3.1 **Council Plan**

The Licensing Service and its Statement of Licensing Policy balance the objective of improving the local economy, improving health and wellbeing and tackling health inequalities and cultural development against noise, nuisance, safeguarding and crime and disorder.

3.2 **Financial Implications**

There are no financial implications in relation to this report.

3.3 **Legal Implications**

In determining the application Members should have regard to the Authority's licensing policy statement and the Secretary of State Guidance. The applicant or any other person who made relevant representations in relation to the application have the right of appeal to the Magistrates Court.

3.4 **Climate Change and Air Quality**

There are no climate change or air quality implications contained in this report.

3.5 **Other (eg Risk, Integrated Impact Assessment or Human Resources)**

Under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 there is no requirement for an Integrated Impact Assessment, while licence conditions should not duplicate other statutory provisions, members should be mindful of requirements and responsibilities placed on them by other legislation, which may include:

- Regulators' Code under the Legislative and Regulatory Reform Act 2006

6.1 Options considered

Members of the Panel are requested to determine the application.

6.2 Reasons for recommended option

In accordance with the requirements as set out in the Licensing Act 2003, where relevant representations are received by either a responsible authority or any other person, the matter is referred to the panel for a decision.

7. Next steps and timelines

7.1 When determining the application Members, having regard to the representation, may take such steps as they consider appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. These steps are:

- Grant the Full Variation application
- Grant the Full Variation application with appropriate conditions
- Exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities which relate to this application, or
- Reject the Full Variation application

7.2 Findings on any issues of fact should be on the balance of probability.

7.3 In arriving at a decision Members must have regard to the relevant provisions of the statutory guidance and the licensing policy statement and reasons must be given for any departure.

7.4 The decision should be based on the individual merits of the application.

FAO Jordan Bennett; I am writing this with regards to new proposed licensing hours for Drub Club in Gomersal. [REDACTED] the opening hours have always been a mystery. We are happy to have a club in the village and feel it is a good asset for the villagers but not with increased hours as proposed. We realise there needs to be strict licensing hours but we feel the new hours proposed are too long. These hours would increase the traffic in and out of the club car park and parking on the already busy, fast lane causing a safety issue for both pedestrians and residents. Increasing taxi noise late into the night as this is already an issue. Also incidents of disorder could increase due to the longer drinking hours as this has already been an issue. People talking/ shouting and swearing in the car park is likely to increase later into the night, this is already apparent. To our knowledge not many Drub residents visit the club, we feel that new hours would increase the club being used more for private parties which at the moment don't seem to have an end time. These people often loiter waiting for taxis/ lifts well after the club has closed. There is already no respect for the neighbouring houses for example taxi horns, loud drunken conversations. Relevant Sections of Secretary of State Guidance – Under Section 182 of Licensing Act 2003

Crime and disorder

2.1 Licensing authorities should look to the police as the main source of advice on crime and disorder. They should also seek to involve the local Community Safety Partnership (CSP).

2.2 In the exercise of their functions, licensing authorities should seek to co-operate with the Security Industry Authority (“SIA”) as far as possible and consider adding relevant conditions to licences where appropriate. The SIA also plays an important role in preventing crime and disorder by ensuring that door supervisors are properly licensed and, in partnership with police and other agencies, that security companies are not being used as fronts for serious and organised criminal activity. This may include making specific enquiries or visiting premises through intelligence led operations in conjunction with the police, local authorities and other partner agencies. Similarly, the provision of requirements for door supervision may be appropriate to ensure that people who are drunk, drug dealers or people carrying firearms do not enter the premises and ensuring that the police are kept informed.

2.3 Conditions should be targeted on deterrence and preventing crime and disorder including the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises (see paragraph 10.10). For example, where there is good reason to suppose that disorder may take place, the presence of closed-circuit television (CCTV) cameras both inside and immediately outside the premises can actively deter disorder, nuisance, anti-social behaviour and crime generally. Some licence holders may wish to have cameras on their premises for the prevention of crime directed against the business itself, its staff, or its customers. But any condition may require a broader approach, and it may be appropriate to ensure that the precise location of cameras is set out on plans to ensure that certain areas are properly covered and there is no subsequent dispute over the terms of the condition.

2.4 The inclusion of radio links and ring-round phone systems should be considered an appropriate condition for public houses, bars and nightclubs operating in city and town centre leisure areas with a high density of licensed premises. These systems allow managers of licensed premises to communicate instantly with the police and facilitate a rapid response to any disorder which may be endangering the customers and staff on the premises.

2.5 Conditions relating to the management competency of designated premises supervisors should not normally be attached to premises licences. It will normally be the responsibility of the premises licence holder as an employer, and not the licensing authority, to ensure that the managers appointed at the premises are competent and appropriately trained. The designated premises supervisor is the key person who will usually be responsible for the day to day management of the premises by the premises licence holder, including the prevention of disorder. A condition of this kind may only be justified as appropriate in rare circumstances

where it can be demonstrated that, in the circumstances associated with particular premises, poor management competency could give rise to issues of crime and disorder and public safety.

2.6 The prevention of crime includes the prevention of immigration crime including the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises. Licensing authorities should work with Home Office Immigration Enforcement, as well as the police, in respect of these matters. Licence conditions that are considered appropriate for the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises might include requiring a premises licence holder to undertake right to work checks on all staff employed at the licensed premises or requiring that a copy of any document checked as part of a right to work check are retained at the licensed premises.

Public safety

2.7 Licence holders have a responsibility to ensure the safety of those using their premises, as a part of their duties under the 2003 Act. This concerns the safety of people using the relevant premises rather than public health which is addressed in other legislation. Physical safety includes the prevention of accidents and injuries and other immediate harms that can result from alcohol consumption such as unconsciousness or alcohol poisoning. Conditions relating to public safety may also promote the crime and disorder objective as noted above. There will of course be occasions when a public safety condition could incidentally benefit a person's health more generally, but it should not be the purpose of the condition as this would be outside the licensing authority's powers (be ultra vires) under the 2003 Act. Conditions should not be imposed on a premises licence or club premises certificate which relate to cleanliness or hygiene.

2.8 A number of matters should be considered in relation to public safety. These may include:

- Fire safety;*
- Ensuring appropriate access for emergency services such as ambulances;*
- Good communication with local authorities and emergency services, for example communications networks with the police and signing up for local incident alerts (see paragraph 2.4 above);*
- Ensuring the presence of trained first aiders on the premises and appropriate first aid kits;*
- Ensuring the safety of people when leaving the premises (for example, through the provision of information on late-night transportation);*
- Ensuring appropriate and frequent waste disposal, particularly of glass bottles;*
- Ensuring appropriate limits on the maximum capacity of the premises (see paragraphs 2.12-2.13, and Chapter 10; and*
- Considering the use of CCTV in and around the premises (as noted in paragraph 2.3 above, this may also assist with promoting the crime and disorder objective).*

2.9 The measures that are appropriate to promote public safety will vary between premises and the matters listed above may not apply in all cases. As set out in Chapter 8 (8.38-8.46), applicants should consider when making their application which steps it is appropriate to take to promote the public safety objective and demonstrate how they achieve that.

Public nuisance

2.15 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance.

2.16 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.

2.17 Conditions relating to noise nuisance will usually concern steps appropriate to control the levels of noise emanating from premises. This might be achieved by a simple measure such as ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time, or persons are not permitted in garden areas of the premises after a certain time. More sophisticated measures like the installation of acoustic curtains or rubber speaker mounts to mitigate sound escape from the premises may be appropriate. However, conditions in relation to live or recorded music may not be enforceable in circumstances where the entertainment activity itself is not licensable (see chapter 16). Any conditions appropriate to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the type, nature and characteristics of the specific premises and its licensable activities. Licensing authorities should avoid inappropriate or disproportionate measures that could deter events that are valuable to the community, such as live music. Noise limiters, for example, are expensive to purchase and install and are likely to be a considerable burden for smaller venues.

2.18 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.

2.19 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the morning.

2.20 Measures to control light pollution will also require careful thought. Bright lighting outside premises which is considered appropriate to prevent crime and disorder may itself give rise to light pollution for some neighbours. Applicants, licensing authorities and responsible authorities will need to balance these issues.

2.21 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in anti-social behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.

Protection of children from harm

2.22 The protection of children from harm includes the protection of children from moral, psychological and physical harm. This includes not only protecting children from the harms associated directly with alcohol consumption but also wider harms such as exposure to strong language and sexual expletives (for example, in the context of exposure to certain films or adult entertainment). Licensing authorities must also consider the need to protect children from sexual exploitation when undertaking licensing functions.

2.23 The Government believes that it is completely unacceptable to sell alcohol to children. Conditions relating to the access of children where alcohol is sold and which are appropriate to protect them from harm should be carefully considered. Moreover, conditions restricting the access of children to premises should be strongly considered in circumstances where:

- adult entertainment is provided;
- a member or members of the current management have been convicted for serving alcohol to minors or with a reputation for allowing underage drinking (other than in the context of the exemption in the 2003 Act relating to 16 and 17 year olds consuming beer, wine and cider when accompanied by an adult during a table meal);
- it is known that unaccompanied children have been allowed access;
- there is a known association with drug taking or dealing; or
- in some cases, the premises are used exclusively or primarily for the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises.

2.24 It is also possible that activities, such as adult entertainment, may take place at certain times on premises but not at other times. For example, premises may operate as a café bar during the day providing meals for families but also provide entertainment with a sexual content after 8.00pm. It is not possible to give an exhaustive list of what amounts to entertainment or services of an adult or sexual nature. Applicants, responsible Revised Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 I 11 authorities and licensing authorities will need to consider this point carefully. This would broadly include topless bar staff, striptease, lap-, table- or pole-dancing, performances involving feigned violence or horrific incidents, feigned or actual sexual acts or fetishism, or entertainment involving strong and offensive language.

2.25 Applicants must be clear in their operating schedules about the activities and times at which the events would take place to help determine when it is not

appropriate for children to enter the premises. Consideration should also be given to the proximity of premises to schools and youth clubs so that applicants take appropriate steps to ensure that advertising relating to their premises, or relating to events at their premises, is not displayed at a time when children are likely to be near the premises.

2.26 Licensing authorities and responsible authorities should expect applicants, when preparing an operating schedule or club operating schedule, to set out the steps to be taken to protect children from harm when on the premises.

2.27 Conditions, where they are appropriate, should reflect the licensable activities taking place on the premises. In addition to the mandatory condition regarding age verification, other conditions relating to the protection of children from harm can include: • restrictions on the hours when children may be present; • restrictions or exclusions on the presence of children under certain ages when particular specified activities are taking place; • restrictions on the parts of the premises to which children may have access; • age restrictions (below 18); • restrictions or exclusions when certain activities are taking place; • requirements for an accompanying adult (including for example, a combination of requirements which provide that children under a particular age must be accompanied by an adult); and • full exclusion of people under 18 from the premises when any licensable activities are taking place.

2.28 Please see also Chapter 10 for details about the Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010.

2.29 Licensing authorities should give considerable weight to representations about child protection matters. In addition to the responsible authority whose functions relate directly to child protection, the Director of Public Health may also have access to relevant evidence to inform such representations. These representations may include, amongst other things, the use of health data about the harms that alcohol can cause to underage drinkers. Where a responsible authority, or other person, presents evidence to the licensing authority linking specific premises with harms to children (such as ambulance data or emergency department attendances by persons under 18 years old with alcohol-related illnesses or injuries) this evidence should be considered, and the licensing authority should also consider what action is appropriate to ensure this licensing objective is effectively enforced. In relation to applications for the grant of a licence in areas where evidence is presented on high levels of alcohol-related harms in persons aged under 18, it is recommended that the licensing authority considers what conditions may be appropriate to ensure that this objective is promoted effectively.

2.30 The 2003 Act provides that, where a premises licence or club premises certificate 12 | Revised Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 authorises the exhibition of a film, it must include a condition requiring the admission of children to films to be restricted in accordance with recommendations given either by a body designated under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 specified in the licence (the British Board of Film Classification is currently the only body which has been so designated) or by the licensing authority itself. Further details are given in Chapter 10.

2.31 Theatres may present a range of diverse activities and entertainment including, for example, variety shows incorporating adult entertainment. It is appropriate in these cases for a licensing authority to consider restricting the admission of children in such circumstances. Entertainments may also be presented at theatres specifically for children. It will be appropriate to consider whether a condition should be attached to a premises licence or club premises certificate which requires the presence of a sufficient number of adult staff on the premises to ensure the wellbeing of the children during any emergency.

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
