(Lead Officer: Martin Wilby)  The petition did not reveal anything material that was not revealed in the non-statutory consultation which had already been undertaken in the lead up to the September 2020 cabinet report. This report made clear the right of the Governing Body of St. John's CE(VC) Infant school, with approval from the Diocese, to publish their own statutory proposals. They exercised this right on 29 April 2021. This triggered an LA decision making process (as the LA remained the decision maker) which led to a cabinet decision on 27 July 2021. This will not prevent onward referral to the Panel where appropriate but will act as a means of avoiding un-necessary duplication.
